





FACTS ABOUT WEST VIRGINIA





West Virginia's Splendid Location.

In the above map the circle around West Virginia has a radius of only 255 miles. Within this boundary is located the Capitol of the greatest republic of time and a dozen of the world's great cities. In initiative men, with their institutions, arts and industries, this area is without a parallel. In natural resources of great variety and immense value it has no counterpart. West Virginia is the very center of this plethora of civilization and holds its greatest natural treasures. Some one has uniquely classed West Virginia as "the most northern

of the southern States, or the most southern of the northern States; the most eastern of the western States or the most western of the eastern States." A location strategic and incomparable for the purposes of trade and commerce.

Could the American continent provide a more cosmopolitan setting for a great State?

There are over 80 steam and electric railroads operating either wholly within the State, or extending across its boundary into the surrounding States. The total railway and electric trackage, including main and side racks, within the State is about 5,870 miles, and the value of such property in West Virginia is over \$200,000,000.00.

West Virginia is a land of flowing streams. Four splendid interior rivers-the Big Sandy, Great Kanawha, Little Kanawha and Monongahela-all having efficient modern locks and dams under the supervision of the Federal Government, bring this economical method of transportation to the very heart of the State. These streams flow through the State to the Ohio, a river which washes her western boundary for nearly 300 miles and then sweeps on to the Mississippi. This sequence of rivers is unrivaled among the navigable waterways of the
