General Rules and Regulations.

Competition is open to every one.

The first day of the Fair will be devoted to receiving, enter ing and arranging stock and articles offered for exhibition. gates will be thrown open, and the grounds will be free during the entire day to all who desire to enter animals or articles, or make arrangements for their accommodation.

The Entry Books will close at 10 A. M. of the second day.

The Marshal will receive the articles and animals intended

for exhibition and place them in their proper divisions.

The gates will be opened at 8 o'clock A. M. A strong police force will be present day and night, and any one who misbehaves within the enclosure during the exhibition will be compelled to leave the grounds.

6. Every article or animal must be entered in the name of the

owner, either by himself or his authorized agent.

Hay and straw will be furnished on the ground to exhib-

tors free of charge, and grain at its market value.

Suitable Stalls and Pens are provided on the ground for all stock that may be entered. Valuable horses, entered for Sweepstakes, will be furnished with tight, clean stalls that can be securely locked.

A large Dining Hall on the grounds furnishes the public

with refreshments at all hours.

The Track is pronounced, by good judges, to be the finest in this section of country. Tickets for the use of the track for driving and training horses during the Summer and Fall are sold by the Corresponding Secretary for a small fee.

When there is but one exhibitor, although he may show several articles or animals in the same class, only one premium will be awarded, as the merit of the article or animal may be adjudged. A premium will not be awarded when the article or animal is not worthy, though there be no competition.

The Directors will take every precaution in their power for the preservation of articles and animals on exhibition, after their arrival and arrangement on the ground, but will not be responsi-

ble for any loss or damage that may occur.

13. If objection is made to any of the judges, it must be done in writing and addressed to the Chief Marshal, stating reasons which he alone shall decide upon.

No person who is an exhibitor can act as judge in the

class in which he exhibits.

- 15. No person, other than the officers of the Association, the judges, exhibitors of stock on examination, and necessary grooms will be permitted to enter the ring while the stock is being exhibited.
 - 16. No article can be exhibited in more than one class.

RULES FOR THE JUDGES.

1. The several Committees appointed by the Directors as judges of the exhibition, will meet at the Secretary's office at 10 o'clock, A. M., on Wednesday, the second day of the Fair, and when called upon by the respective Marshals, shall proceed immediately to the discharge of their respective duties.

2. The judges will be furnished with books of entries, withholding the names of the exhibitors, reference being made to the numbers affixed to the different articles or animals submitted for their examination, and a statement of what premiums are offered; and no premium will be awarded any article or animal not regularly entered on their books. After the committees have completed their labors, they will, at least two of them, sign their names to the report as judges, in the book, and, without further delay, return the books to the Secretary.

3. The judges of Cattle will have reference to the symmetry, early maturity, size and general characteristics of the breeds which they judge. They will make proper allowance for age, feeding and other circumstances, of the character and condition of animals. They are especially required not to give encouragement to over-fed animais. No premiums will be awarded to bulls, cows or heifers which appear to have been fatened for the butcher—unless entered under the head of fat cattle; the object being to have superior animals of this description for breeding.

4. No person whatever will be allowed to interfere with the judges during their adjudication. The judges, if not satisfied as to the regularity of entries in their respective classes, will apply to the Secretary for information; and, should there be any doubt, after examination, of their coming within the regulations, or if any article or animal is of such a character as not to be entitled to exhibition in competition, they will report the fact to the Directors, that such course may be adopted as the case may require.

5. The judges of Fat Cattle will give particular attention to the animals submitted to them for examination. It is believed that, all other thing being equal, those are the best cattle that have the greatest weight in the smallest surfaces. The cattle in this class must be weighed before being brought upon the ground, and the certificate of weigher handed to the Secretary at the time of entry, and the judges will take measures to give the superficies in each.

6. The judges will be expected in all cases, in making their reports, to give the reasons for their decisions, embracing the valuable and desirable qualities of the articles and animals for which the premiums were awarded.

7. Premium Cards will be furnished the judges, who shall, after thorough examination, immediately attach them to the articles meriting.

8. Premium Ribbons will be furnished the judges in the Stock Department, who shall, after thorough examination, immediately attach them to the animal or animals meriting, Red denoting first; White second; Blue third, and Green fourth premiums.

9. The Marshal of each Department shall read and fully explain the foregoing Rules to the judges of each class in his department, before they enter upon their duties, and any premium awarded in violation of the same will not be paid by the Association.

To. Awarding Committees, after carefully examining each article or animal, shall, without consultation with each other, hand in their choice for first premium to the Marshal, and if on examination no choice has been made, the Committee may consult with each other and agree upon their award. The second premium will be awarded in the same way as the first. In case of a tie, another judge shall be called in by the Marshal of Department, whose vote shall be confined to the entries having the greatest number of votes, and shall be final.

COMPLIMENTARY.

The Stockholders of this Association, Officers of similar Societies, Ministers in charge of congregations and Members of the Press will be furnished with Complimentary Tickets by calling and registering their names at the Ticket Office.

EXHIBITORS.

All Exhibitors of Live Stock will be furnished with Exhibitors' Tickets, which will entitle them to free admission at all hours. But only one ticket will be given to each exhibitor, whether he exhibits in one Class or more, or has one animal or many. This ticket may be given in the name of the exhibitor, or his agent or groom, at the option of the party, and will pass only the person whose name is written on it. No premium will be paid on any animal that is not entered in the name of the owner, even though the judges should award it.

**HORSE+DEPARTMENTS*

RULES RELATING TO HORSES.

- 1. The Books of Entry for all live stock will positively be closed at 10 o'clock, A. M., of the Second day of the Fair, and under no consideration will they be re-opened for the entry of any animal after that time.
- 2. Entries of Live Stock will be received at any time within two weeks prior to the opening of the Fair, and up to the hour of closing the books, and may be made by letter, telegram, or in person, although the stock so entered may not be brought to the grounds until the second day of the exhibition.
- 3. No animal will be permitted to enter the grounds or occupy a stall until it is regularly entered on the books, and the entry card attached to the animal or posted on the stall.
- 4. Exhibitors of Blooded Horses will be required to deposit with the Secretary, at the time of making the entry, an authentic pedigree of each animal. The judges will not award any animal a premium until such satisfactory certificate is furnished them, nor will any premium be paid when the award is made without it.
- 5. All the Different Classes of Horses will be required to report on the track, in front of the Judges' Stand, at the exact time indicated on the programme and announced by the ringing of the bell, and no other notice will be given exhibitors.
- Vehicles and Horses will be required to pass around the ground to the right, and observe the same direction while they remain within the enclosure.

Rules and Regulations

To Govern the Trials of Speed on the Fair Grounds of the Monongalia Agricultural Association, at Morgantown, W. Va.

- Nature of Rules.—All trials of speed which shall come off over this track will be governed by these Rules.
- 2. Power of Postponement.—In cases of unfavorable weather, or other unavoidable causes all Sweepstakes announced to come off may, by a majority of the Directors, be postponed to a future time, upon giving notice of the same.
- 3. Trials of Speed.—In all trials of speed, except Sweepstakes for Trotters, horses will be allowed to go in harness or under saddle, at the option of the owners; but after a choice has been made, no deviation will be allowed. In Sweepstakes for Trotters all must go in harness.
- 4. Unfair Gait.—Horses deemed by the judges not fair trotting horses (when entered as such), shall be ruled off previous to, or distanced at the termination of the heat.
- 5. Time Between Heats.—The time between heats shall be: For one mile, 20 minutes; for every additional mile an additional five minutes.
- Difference of Opinion Between Judges.—Should a difference of opinion exist between the judges on any question, a majority shall govern.
- 7. Judges' Duties.—The judges shall order the horses harnessed and saddled five minutes before starting, and any rider or driver causing undue detention, after being called up, by making a false start or otherwise, the judges may give the word to start without reference to the situation of the horse so offending, unless convinced that such delay is unavoidable on the part of the rider or driver.
- 8. Starting Horses.—The pole (or choice of track) shall be drawn for by the judges; the horse winning the heat shall, the next succeeding heat, be entitled to a choice of the track, the other horses occupying the same relative position they did at termination of the previous heat. On coming out on the last stretch, each horse shall retain the position on the track first selected. Any horse deviating shall be distanced.
- Penalty for Foul Riding and Driving.—Any rider or driver committing any act which
 the judges may deem foul riding or driving, shall be distanced.
- 10. Horses Breaking.—Should any horse break from his pace, trot or rack, it shall be the duty of the driver or rider to pull his horse to his gait immediately, and in case of the rider or driver refusing to do so, the penalty shall be that the next horse shall have the heat. If the rider or driver shall comply with the above, and he shall gain by such break, twice the distance so gained shall be taken away on the coming out. A horse breaking on the score shall not lose the heat by so doing.
- 11. Relating to Dead Heats.—When a dead heat is made between two horses, that if either had won the heat the race would have been decided, they two only shall start again.
- 12. In races best two in three, a horse not winning one heat in three shall not start for the fourth heat, unless such horse shall have made a dead heat. In races best three in five, a horse shall win one heat in five to be allowed to start for the sixth heat, unless such horse shall have made a dead heat. Such horses as are prevented from starting by this rule, shall be considered withdrawn and not distanced.

- 13. On Heats and Distances.—If two horses each win a heat, and neither is distanced in the race, the one coming out ahead in the last heat is to be considered the best. The same rule to be applied to horses neither winning a heat nor distanced. If one horse wins a heat he isb etter than one that does not, provided he does not get distanced in the race; then the other, if not distanced, shall be the best. A horse that wins a heat and is distanced is better than one not winning a heat and being distanced in the same heat. A horse distanced in the second heat is better than a horse distanced in the first heat. A horse distancing all competitors shall receive first money alone.
- 14. In Cases of Dispute and Improper Conduct.—In cases not provided for by these rules the judges for day will decide finally.
- 15. Size of Whips to be Used.—No rider or driver shall be allowed any other than a reasonable length of whip, viz: For saddle horses, two feet ten inches; sulky, four feet eight inches, wagons, five feet ten inches.
- 16. Horses Drawn.—Horses drawn before the conclusion of a race shall be considered distanced.
- 17. Distances.—In one mile heats, best three in five, a distance is one hundred yards. In one mile heats, best two in three, a distance is eighty yards. In every additional mile an additional eighty yards. [This rule may be dispensed with at the option of the Directors.]
- 18. It shall be the duty of every rider or driver to report to the judges at the termination of each heat before dismounting.
- 19, Bets or Wagers.—No horse that has been sold in pools, or upon which any bet or wager is pending, subject to the result of any trial of speed upon said track, shall be allowed to participate in the same, when such fact is established to the satisfaction of the officers controlling the same.
- 20 In all contests for Sweepstakes premiums, except where it is otherwise provided, two entries must be made before any premium will be paid.
- 21. Weight to be Carried.—Every Trotting or Pacing horse, starting for Sweepstake premiums or purses, shall carry one hundred and forty-five pounds. If in harness, this weight shall be exclusive of harness and sulky; but if to saddle, shall include saddle and blanket.
- 22. Bell Signal.—In trials of speed, all drivers will be controlled be the following bell signals. Any driver failing to respond to these signals, or delaying in order to favor his horse, will be declared distanced. THREE TAPS of the bell call the horses to the score; ONE TAP sends them off; TWO TAPS call them back.

The correct time of each heat will be exhibited on the blackboard at the Judges' Stand, and the time thus given shall be regarded as official announcement, and no deception will be allowed to be practiced.

The Rules of the National Association shall govern all matters not provided for, and not in conflict with the foregoing rules,

Rules and Regulations

OF THE

Floral, Agricultural and Manufacturers' Hall.

1. The Books of Entry at these Halls will open at 8 o'clock on the morning of the first, and close at exactly 10 o'clock on the morning of the second day of the Fair, and under no consideration will they be opened again after the time specified for closing.

2. Exhibitors are requested to make their entries on the First Day, as the officers will have more time to receive the articles and arrange them to the best advantage.

3. Persons desiring to enter articles in these Halls will apply to the ticket office for an ENTRY TICKET, which will contain blanks for the name of article, the name of the owner and the class in which the article is entered. These blanks must be filled up, and the ticket attached to the article before is presented at the Hall.

No article will be allowed to compete for a premium, nor will the judges be permitted to award a premium on any article unless an entry ticket is attached thereto; but any person may place articles in these halls for exhibition, by the permission of the Marshal, that are not designed to compete for premiums.

5. After the articles are entered upon the books, and before the examination by the judges, the Marshal shall tear off the name of the exhibitor from each entry ticket, leaving the remainder of the ticket attached to the article.

6. After the premium are awarded by the judges, premiums cards must be attached to the articles receiving them, and the awards entered in a book provided for that purpose, and signed by at least a majority of the judges.

7, From 10 o'clock A. M., till 12 M., on the second day of the Fair, these Halls will be occupied exclusively by the judges and Marshals, during which time the awards of premiums will be made, and the halls will then be thrown open during the entire exhibition.

 No one will be allowed to handle or remove any of the articles on exhibition in these Halls until the conclusion of the Fair.
