



ANNUAL REPORT

OF

A. L. WADE,

County Superintendent of Free Schools of Monongalia County, West Virginia,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING AUGUST 31, 1876.

Although one hundred years have clapsed since we as a Nation became free, only thirteen years have gone by since the free school system was adopted in West Virginia. Previous to its adoption we had no system providing either for the building of school houses or the employment of teachers. It is a remarkable fact, that Monongalia county, for many years the seat of Monongalia Academy, Woodburn Seminary, and The Morgantown Female Collegiate Institute, had in all its country districts in 1863, but one school house, which was by the school officers regarded worthy to remain as a school house. This house is situated at Fort Martin, in Cass district, and is a standing compliment to the people of that community.

This county is divided into eight school districts—Cass, Grant, Clay, Battelle, Morgan, Union, Clinton, and The Morgantown Independent School District. These, with the exception of the last named, are sub-divided, forming seventy-seven sub-districts.

OUR SCHOOL HOUSES.

Under the superintendency of Geo. C. Sturgiss and H. L. Cox, esq'rs, my predecessors in office, a neat frame school house was erected in each of these sub-districts, with the single exception of the Fort Martin school house above named. Most of these houses were built more than ten years ago, and nearly all of them need repainting. Boards of Education should have this done before these beautiful buildings are permanently injured. I would also recommend that the several boards of education place in each school a copy of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary, as a standard of pronunciation. Many of our schools have Outline Maps, and the residue should be supplied. Each school should also be provided with a Globe. These would cost but little, and in the hands of competent instructors would be a paying investment.

Pawpaw school house, in Battelle district, was burned on the night of the 17th of December, supposed by many to be the work of an incendiary; but the patrons of the school secured a private house, and opened school again in one week after the house was destroyed. A new house is being erected upon the same foundation. Three other new houses will be built this year—one in Battelle, one in Clay, and one in Morgan.

YOUTHS ENUMERATED-AVERAGE ATTENDANCE.

We have in our county more than five thousand youths who are entitled to the privileges of our free schools. A little over four hundred of these are in the Morgantown Independent School District. The residue are distributed among the several schools of the county. Some of the schools have an enumeration of over one hundred, while a few have less than twenty-five. I have not yet received reports from the various boards of education, but I am of the opinion that the average attendance upon the schools did not exceed fifty per cent of the enumeration. Quite a number of the influential tax-payers in our county are heartily in favor of a compulsory law, and I believe that unless something be done to improve the attendance upon our free schools, we will have such a law in West Virginia in less than five years from this time. I am still opposed to the passage of such a law, not because it is wrong, but because it is difficult to enforce it. I am in favor of making the teacher's salary in some degree dependent upon a fair average attendance. I would also make his salary dependent in some degree upon the progress of his pupils. I am aware of the difficulties that would lie in the way of ascertaining what progress each pupil makes, but there is no difficulty in ascertaining the attendance. It would cost less to carry out a law regulating salaries according to the above suggestions than it would to enforce the compulsory law, and I believe that teachers, when interested, could bring into the school more pupils than officers of the law could, and certainly with less dissatisfaction. It is true, my plan would give some teachers higher wages than they now receive, and it would give others lower wages. It would encourage successful teachers to continue in the work, while it would drive unsuccessful teachers from the school room. This plan would be much better than to let the teacher's salary depend entirely upon his expertness in answering questions on the day of his examination.

TEACHERS EMPLOYED.

We employed last fall, in the country districts, seventyseven teachers-sixty-four males and thirteen females,twenty were married and fifty-seven single. Fifty-eight were residents of this county, four were from Marion county, West Virginia, and fifteen were residents of Pennsylvania. Although some of the non residents employed were among the best teachers we had, yet to take them all as a class, they fell below our own teachers. As a rule, the best teachers do not go abroad, but are employed at home. There are various reasons, all else being equal, why we should employ our own teachers in preference to strangers. We have to-day in our county not less than two hundred young men and women who have fair qualifications for teaching. But I am not in favor of employing home teachers regardless of qualification. My advice to each trustee is, employ the best teacher you can obtain, and keep him as long as he does first-class work. The theory that we need a new teacher every term, has long since been exploded. A live teacher will become more interesting to his pupils as they become better acquainted with him: a dead man should never be employed in the school room. We want teachers who are called to teach; who

are inspired with a love for the work, and we can afford to pay such teachers. I am quite certain that no county in West Virginia has a more efficient and earnest class of teachers than we have.

LENGTH OF TERM.

Grant district, at the last election, with remarkable unanimity, voted in favor of a levy for five months school; the other districts kept their schools open four months.

VISITING SCHOOLS.

I visited every school in the county, spending usually a morning or an afternoon in each; noting in my journal the name of the school, the number of pupils entitled to attend, number on teacher's roll, daily average attendance, branches taught, and the number of pupils studying each I made it a point, as far as possible, to become acquainted, personally, with each pupil in the school, and to ascertain what branches were pursued by each. In order to bring together all interested parties, teachers, parents and pupils, for the consideration of matters pertaining to the schools visited during the day, and for the consideration of questions relating to our free school interests generally, we held, each evening, an educational meeting. In these meetings I was aided by representative men, friends of free schools, Professors in the University, teachers, ministers, physicians, farmers and mechanics. I held forty-three of these

EDUCATIONAL MASS MEETINGS

in the county,—twenty-seven in churches, fifteen in school houses, and one at the residence of Milton Sine, where

the school house had been burned. In addition to the addresses which were delivered, we had each evening, the best music which the community could produce. The school law prescribes a

COURSE OF STUDY IN THE FREE SCHOOLS.

Section 11 of the school law reads as follows: "In the primary schools there shall be taught Orthography, Reading, Penmanship, Arithmetic, English Grammar, History, Geography, and such other branches as the board of education may direct." It is but reasonable to expect that each youth who has the advantages of our free schools, if properly instructed, shall, at the age of twenty-one years, have a fair knowledge of each of the above named branches. And yet how few take up the entire course. In order to induce pupils to take up and complete the entire course of study, I introduced the system of grading each school, by forming a class in each, wherever I could do so, noting in my journal the names of pupils who volunteered to complete the course by the first of March, 1876. The classes so formed were termed

GRADUATING CLASSES FOR 1876.

In some of the schools no such class could be formed for want of material. Those who entered these classes I made prominent by reading their names in the schools of the adjacent sub-district, and in our educational meetings; also by publishing them in our county newspaper. I also organized classes for 1877, and published names as I did for 1876. I requested each teacher, provided he found material for doing so, to form a class for 1878, and one for

1879, and most of the teachers did so. In order to test the work of these classes, I introduced a system of

ANNUAL DISTRICT EXAMINATIONS,

to be held about the last of February or the first of March, each year, to be conducted by the County Super-intendent, aided by such educators of experience as he may be able to procure. Each pupil, upon completing the course of study and passing a fair examination in all the branches, is entitled to

A DIPLOMA,

signed by his teacher, who certifies that he has completed the course, by the County Superintendent, who certifies that he has been examined, and by the President of the Board of Education of his district, who certifies that said pupil is of good moral character.

I held an examination for these classes in each district in the county. These examinations commenced at ten A. M. and closed about 4 P. M. In the evening of each day we held a Commencement Exercise, consisting of essays, orations, &c., by members of the classes, followed by addresses from prominent educators.

These district examinations were held in churches in the following order:

Grant District, at Zoar Baptist Church, on Friday, February 25th, 1876. This district has thirteen schools. The printed roll, numbering 61, was called, and fifty members responded. The residue having failed to complete the course, were transferred to the class of 1877. All the teachers of the district were present. The examination

was conducted by the County Superintendent, assisted by Prof. H. L. Cox, Principal of Morgantown Graded School. In the evening addresses were made by Prof. W. R. White, ex-State Superintendent of Free Schools of West Virginia, and Prof. D. B. Purinton, of West Virginia University.

Union District, at Peirpoint's M. E. Church, Saturday, February 26th. This district has eight schools. Roll, numbering 50, was called, and 38 responded. All the teachers were present. Examination conducted by the County Superintendent, assisted by Prof. F. S. Lyon, Principal of Preparatory Department of West Virginia University, and Prof. H. L. Cox. Addresses were delivered in the evening by Profs. White, Lyon and Purinton.

Morgan District, at Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, Friday, March 3d. This district has eight schools. Roll, numbering 21, was called, and 19 responded. All the teachers were present. Prof. White assisted in the examination. Addresses in the evening by Profs. Cox, White, Purinton, and Prof. S. H. Owen of West Virginia University.

Cass District, at Bethel M. E. Church, Saturday, March, 4th. This district contains eight schools. Roll, numbering 30, called, and 21 were present. All the teachers of the district were present, except two, and these two were residents of Pennsylvania. Prof. White assisted in the examination, and in the evening delivered an address.

Clay District, at Valley Chapel Christian Church, on Tuesday, March 7th. This district contains thirteen schools. Roll of 23 names called, and 17 answered. All the teachers were present except one—a resident of this county. Prof. Lyon assisted the County Superintendent in examining the classes. In the evening addresses were made by Prof. Lyon and Hon. William Price.

Battelle District, at West Warren Baptist Church, on Thursday, March 9th. This district has 13 schools. Roll of 34 was called and 24 responded; but four of these afterwards withdrew from the class, not being fully prepared in all the branches of the course. All the teachers of the district were present, except two—one a resident of our county and the other a Pennsylvanian. One teacher who was present, declined to assist the other teachers in examining manuscripts and deciding who were entitled to diplomas. He was a resident of Pennsylvania. Prof. Lyon assisted the Superintendent in the examination, and in the evening addressed the audience.

Clinton District, at Goshen Baptist Church, Saturday, March 11th. This district contains fourteen schools.—Roll of 42 names was called, and 31 answered. All the teachers were present. Prof. Lyon assisted in the examination. In the evening addresses were made by Profs. Lyon, Owen and Purinton.

The County Superintendent each evening, after the addresses were ended, and in the presence of the audience, delivered to each member of the class who was by the teachers of the district adjudged worthy of the same, a

DIPLOMA, OR HONORARY CERTIFICATE,

9x14 inches, duly signed as heretofore set forth, which, when framed, is an ornament to a parlor and an honor to

the holder. Two hundred and sixty-one pupils entered the class of 1876, and of this number one hundred and ninety-six completed the course and obtained diplomas.

It is a matter of astonishment to many persons that, with a single exception, the largest churches in the several districts were insufficient to accommodate, even during the day, the vast numbers who came to witness the examinations. And these were not disinterested spectators; they were our most intelligent people-the cream of society, men and women who had sons, or daughters, or grand-children, or friends in the class, in whom they were deeply interested. These examinations were by no means "child's play;" they were intended to test the knowledge of each pupil in the free school branches; and yet, with a very few exceptions, the members of the various classes showed a coolness, a courage, and a knowledge of the branches studied, which many of our teachers do not possess. But they do not expect to cease to study because they have graduated in the primary branches. They expect to work to obtain more thorough knowledge of these branches. Many of them intend to take up the higher branches. Some of them have already entered the West Virginia University or Morgantown Female Seminary.-Others are attending the Fairmont State Normal School. We have had two select schools during the summer, in which the higher branches were taught-one at Bethel, in Cass district, taught by Miss C. S. Burnett, the other at Haught's Mills, in Battelle district, taught by Mr. A. J. Ammons. These have been well attended. We have had

several primary schools in session also, during the spring and summer.

In order to cause each school to stand upon its own merits, and in order to preserve a record of what each school has accomplished since the adoption of the free school system, I proposed the publication of a

CATALOGUE OF THE FREE SCHOOLS OF MONONGALIA COUNTY,

and in order to obtain from each school a report, I placed in the hands of each teacher a printed blank which, when filled up, gives the following particulars of each school: name of teacher, number of pupils entitled to attend, number on teacher's roll, daily average attendance, branches taught, number studying each branch, names of pupils who attended this school under the free school system and became teachers, names of pupils who completed all the free school branches in this school and have not taught, names of pupils in the class of 1876, of 1877, of 1878 and 1879. A committee of seven teachers was appointed, consisting of H. L. Cox, of Grant district, D. B. Waters, of Cass, E. Moakley, of Clay, A. J. Ammons, of Battelle, A. C. Wood, of Morgan, G. W. Laishley, of Union, and E. Trickett, of Clinton, whose duty it was to collect reports from teachers, and to let out the contract for publishing the catalogues. Mr. Moakly soon after left the county, and G. W. Johnston was appointed in his place. This committee met at Morgantown on the 26th day of June, having reports from most of the schools, and awarded the contract for publishing the catalogue to the editors of the Morgantown Post, at the sum of ten cents per copy. A little over fifty dollars had been subscribed, an average of about seventy cents from each school. Blacksville school, in Clay district, subscribed \$3.00—the largest sum of any school in the county; several schools made no subscriptions. A few teachers failed to fill up and return their reports, and in order to make our catalogues complete, I made a brief abstract from my journal concerning each school not reported, which will appear in the catalogue. So we have accompanying my report, a report from every school in the county. The catalogues, when printed, will be delivered to the several members of the publishing committee, and by them to the teachers, and by the teachers to the pupils who subscribed for them. Each pupil who subscribed 10 cents is entitled to one copy.

The system of grading, publishing catalogues and granting certificates or diplomas to those who complete a course of study, has long been practiced in Universities, Colleges, Academies, and High Schools, but I am not aware that it has ever been adopted in primary schools; and yet I can see no reason why it will not work as well in the latter as in the former, as human nature is the same everywhere. That which will induce a young man to make a special effort in his college course, would have its influence upon a young man in our free schools. I observed frequently in our educational meetings, that when I named the most advanced pupils in the schools there represented, that the parents and friends of such pupils were especially interested in my remarks, and these names became the topic of conversation after the meeting closed. I I noticed also that when I published these? names in the newspaper, those

who were interested were especially anxious to obtain a

copy of the paper.

A gentleman said to me, "I do wish you would hurry and publish the list of graduates in our school, my boy is so anxious to see his name in print." Another gentleman said to his son in my presence: "You have entered this class; your name has been published; do your best; nothing would be more gratifying to me than to see you succeed, nothing more mortifying than for you to fail."—God has wisely implanted in all of us a desire to have our names, and the names of our kindred and friends, mentioned in connection with honorable positions.

One of the highest rewards which we can offer the diligent and obedient pupil, is to honor him, and it is no small degree of punishment to the slothful and disobedient to let him go unhonored. I hope that each teacher who shall take charge of a school in our county this fall, will organize, if possible, four classes proposing to complete the course in 1877-8-9 and '80, and let all pupils who cannot enter one of these classes, constitute the preparatory department of the school.

THE MORGANTOWN GRADED SCHOOL.

But my report would be incomplete should I close without making special reference to The Morgantown Graded School, which is intended to accommodate the Morgantown Independent School District.

The school commissioners of this district in 1868 purchased of the State of West Virginia what was formerly known as Monongalia Academy for \$13,500. Nearly 400

youths are entitled to attend this school It is kept open eight months in each year.

Prof. H. L. Cox has been principal of this school for four years past, and under his supervision it has been increasing in thoroughness, until I feel quite sure that no more thorough work is done in any school of like character in this State. Mr. Cox has few equals as an educator. His assistants: Miss M. Brock, Miss S. R. Coyle, Miss L. Shisler and Mrs. L. R. Coogle, have occupied their positions for several years past. The highest compliment that a teacher receives is tendered him, when his employers, after testing his work, desire to retain his services. A new department has been created in this school, and Miss Frank M. Wood has been elected to take charge of it.

THE COLORED SCHOOL OF MORGANTOWN

has an enumeration of nearly 50 pupils. It was kept open five months. A number of its pupils are making considerable progress in the free school branches. Capt. Samuel Sears is still its superintendent, and Miss Belle Jenkins is its teacher. I would suggest that the School Board procure a suitable lot and build thereon a school house. There are about 25 colored pupils in the county outside of this district. Boards of Education should set apart a fund for them, as required by sec. 18 of the school law.

THANKS.

I cannot conclude this report without returning my heartfelt thanks, not only to the gentlemen whom I have named above, but to all who aided me in my work. Prominent among those who made addresses at our educational meetings, I will name Rev. A. A. Jimeson, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Morgantown; Rev. E. W. Ryan, pastor of Morgantown station M. E. Church; Rev. B. Ison, pastor of Morgantown circuit M, E. Church, and Col. James Evans. Many others rendered efficient help at meetings held in the districts in which they reside.

I am also placed under great obligations to those who added so much to the interest of our meetings and exam-

inations, by supplying us with

VOCAL AND INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC.

I desire to name Messrs. John Jones, Z. T. Martin and John N. Snider, instructors in vocal music, and Misses Emma Coombs, Florence Lyon, Emma Crouch, Belle Davis and Lizzie Anderson, and Mr. Garrett Conn, organists. I acknowledge my obligations to Trustees of Churches, who granted us the use of twenty-seven Churches in which to hold educational meetings, and permitted us to use seven of these a second time for district examinations.

The Morgantown Post is entitled to many thanks from the friends of free schools, for publishing gratuitously reports of educational meetings and district examinations throughout the county, and also for publishing lists of names of those who entered the class of 1876 and of 1877.

I return thanks to the various families who so kindly entertained me at their firesides while I was engaged in visiting schools. I should certainly be ungrateful should I fail to acknowledge the uniform kindness and courtesy of our teachers. I wish to say a word to

COUNTY SUPERINTENDENTS IN WEST VIRGINIA.

Will you not try our system of grading schools, granting honorary certificates and publishing catalogues? There are hundreds of young men and women in our schools who have taken up no study beyond arithmetic. Let such take up also geography, English grammar and history. They will master each of these branches just as soon as they would a single study. Let them agree to complete these in a given length of time. Keep this fact before them and their friends and the public, in every possible way, and you will soon have an educational revival.

West Virginia has accomplished more in the work of building school houses, and setting in operation the machinery of the free school system in the last thirteen years, than any other State of like territory and wealth ever did in a quarter of a century. She has also in that time founded a State University and six Normal Schools. Born into the family of States amidst the great civil war, and having for her early and intimate associates, her elder sisters—Ohio on the west, and Pennsylvania on the north, West Virginia has, under a kind Providence, already reached a maturity in educational matters unhoped for by her most sanguine friends.
