WEST VIRGINIA Vir-jin'e-a "Little Mountain"

Historical.—State formed from western and northwestern parts of Virginia which rejected the ordinance of secession of April 17, 1861. Preliminary organization effected at Wheeling, where later Constitutional convention changed name for proposed State from Kanawha to West Virginia. Constitution ratified by people, 1862. State admitted into Union, June 19, 1863. Capital at Wheeling until April, 1870; Charleston until 1875; Wheeling until 1885, when Charleston again became capital.

Area.—24,170 sq. m.; land, 24,022; water, 148; extreme length, 225 miles; breadth, 200. Counties, 55. Assessed valuation, 1919,* real \$767,653,310; personal, \$372,631,062.

Physical Features.—Surface largely mountainous or hilly; traversed by numerous parallel ranges of Appalachian system; greatest altitude, Spruce Knob, 4,860 ft. Western two-thirds, a plateau draining into Ohio River, which forms navigable boundary for 300 miles. Potomac only important river flowing to Atlantic. The numerous streams furnish valuable water-power and some inland navigation. State famed for beauty and grandeur of its mountain scenery and for valuable mineral springs. **Climate** healthful, without great extremes. Winter generally short and not severe; summers long. Mean annual rainfall at Parkersburg, 42 in.; mean annual temperature, 53.9 deg.; highest, 99 deg.; lowest, 11 deg. below.

Agriculture.—State contains large areas of arable land. Number of farms, 1920, 87,289; average, 109.6 acres. Total farm property, \$496,439,617. Value of all crops, 1919,\$96,537,459. Corn the leading crop of the State; hay next in value. Tobacco important; large areas especially adapted to its culture. Grapes, apples of superior quality, peaches, pears, plums, cherries, and all small fruits do well. Crops, 1919,* Corn, 17,010,357 bu.; oats, 3,054,668 bu.; wheat, 3,747,812 bu.; buckwheat, 537,883 bu.; hay and forage, 1,099,679 tons; potatoes, 2,809,398 bu.; tobacco, 7,587,052 lbs.; apples, 4,189,162 bu.; peaches, 706,411 bu.; cherries, 42,861 bu.; strawberries, 840,273 qts.

Farm Animals.—State particularly adapted to stock raising, especially sheep. Finest grazing region, in valley of Kanawha River. Blue grass indigenous in many counties. Value of live stock on farms, 1920, \$67,261,153; of dairy products, 1919, \$11,390,209; eggs, 21,708,279 doz.; chickens raised in 1919, \$4,142,294. Horses, 1920, 169,148, \$17,829,634; mules, 14,981, \$1,839,287; dairy cattle, 255,021, \$15,307,562; other cattle, 332,441, \$18,419,657; sheep, 509,831, \$5,049,727; pigs, 305,211, \$4,046,132. Wool noted for its superior quality; clip, 1919, 2,442,090 lbs.

Minerals.—Pre-eminently a mining State. Coal area, over 17,280 sq. m., mines employing ab. 92,000 persons; in 1919,* State ranked second in production; output 75,500,000 tons. Most important fields Fairmont and Elk Garden in northern, and Pocahontas and New and Kanawha River fields in southern part of State. Ranks far ahead of other States in production of natural gas; output, 1918,* \$41,324,365. In 1918, ranked eighth in petroleum; output 7,866,628 bbls., \$31,652,018. Clay products, 1916,* \$6,284,527, chiefly common and paving brick. Valuable deposits of iron ores, limestone, and sandstone. Salt springs in valleys

of Ohio and Kanawha rivers. Black marble, glass sand, valuable clays, saltpeter, ocher, and bromine found. Total mineral output, 1916,* \$187,043,011 (rank third).

Manufactures.—Abundant water-power, timber, and minerals afford excellent natural advantages for manufacturing industries, the most important developments being in the line of lumber, leather, iron and steel products, glass, brick, flour, coke, tobacco, cotton and woolen goods, vehicles, canned goods, etc. State led in hardwood production, 1910 to 1917; in 1920, rank second, next to Ark. Lumber cut, 1918,* 720,000,000 ft. (oak, 175,130,000 ft.; beech, 36,631,000; hickory, 8,759,000; maple, 58,009,000; birch, 15,678,000; ash, 5 854,000; basswood, 17,195,000; spruce, 45,258,000; chestnut, 85,123,000; yellow poplar, 52,462,000; walnut, 800,000; hemlock, 85,511,000). Coke output, 1918,* 3,320,000 tons. In 1914,* State had 2,749 establishments; capital invested, \$175,995,000; wage-earners, 71,078; paid in wages, \$43,784,000; cost of raw materials, \$110,033,000; value of products, \$193,512,000.

Population.—1870, 442,014; 1900, 958,800; 1910, 1,221,119; 1920, 1,463,701, 25.2 per cent urban.

Cities.—*Wheeling*, metropolis and former capital, settled 1774; leading industrial and commercial center of State; noted for its nail factories, and has large tobacco works and blast furnaces. *Huntington*, second city, has petroleum refineries and manufactures; lumber interests extensive. *Clarksburg*, rich coal center. *Parkersburg*, center of petroleum industry, has oil refineries, iron foundries, lumber mills, and machine shops. *Charleston*, capital, center of rich agricultural district, and outlet for an important mining territory.

Railways.—Mileage, 1850, 97; 1860, 352; 1900, 2,473; 1911, 3,648; 1921, 3,990.

Education.—Public school enrollment, 1919-20, 341,977; expended per capita of population, 1918,* \$4.86. Teachers, 1919-20, 11,406. Public high schools, 172; pupils, 18,512. West Virginia University, Morgantown, founded 1868. Bethany College, Bethany; Wesleyan University, Buckhannon; and many other private denominational schools. Public normal schools at Athens, Fairmont, Glenville, West Liberty, Huntington, and Shepherdstown. Colored normal and industrial schools at Institute and Bluefield. Storer College (colored), Harpers Ferry; School for Deaf and Blind, Romney. Industrial School for Boys, Pruntytown; Industrial Home for Girls, Industrial.

Political.—State elections quadrennial. State Senators, 30; Representatives, 94; sessions biennial, terms of Senators 4 years; Representatives, 2 years. Electoral votes, 8. Term of Governor, 4 years. Voters must be actual citizens, residents of State 1 year, county 60 days. Congressional districts, 6.

Legal Holidays.—Jan. 1, Feb. 12 and 22, May 30, July 4, Labor Day, general election day, Thanksgiving, Dec. 25.

Legal.—Statute of limitations: Judgments, 10 years; open accounts, 5; notes, 10. Legal interest rate, 6 per cent.

WEATHER FORECASTS

The operations of the weather bureau of the department of agriculture are based on observations of the weather taken at about two hundred observatories throughout the United States at the same moment of time and telegraphed daily to Washington, D. C., and to other important cities. These observations, comprising barometric pressure, temperature, precipitation, winds and clouds, are entered upon outline charts of the United States by means of symbols, forming the "daily weather map," from which the forecasts are made. These forecasts are issued every day for every state in the Union, and whenever necessary special warnings are sent out of storms, frosts, cold waves, heavy snows and floods. In addition to the main office in Washington, there are subordinate forecast centers in Chicago, New Orleans, Denver, San Francisco and Portland, Ore. Weather forecasts for a week in advance are now sent out from Washington.

The forecasts are first telegraphed to about 2,300 principal distributing points, whence they are further disseminated by telegraph, telephone and through the mail by means of forecast cards, rural free delivery slips and newspapers.

Radio Service. Through the co-operation of the Navy Department and wireless telegraph companies, all weather observations taken on vessels having wireless equipment are promptly forwarded to the Weather Bureau office at Washington, San Francisco, and Honolulu, according to the position of the ship.

Weather forecasts and storm warnings and weather conditions at 8 a.m., 75th meridian time, are broadcast each day on regular schedule from nearly all naval radio stations on the Atlantic, Gulf of Mexico, and Pacific coasts and in the Caribbean Sea. In addition, weather reports from a considerable number of land stations, wind and weather forecasts, and storm and hurricane warnings are broadcast from the naval radio stations at Arlington, Va. (10 p.m.); Key West, Fla. (10 p.m.) San Juan, P. R. (9 p.m.); Point Isabel, Tex. (midnight); and Great Lakes, Ill. (10 p.m.).

A comprehensive bulletin, for aviation as well as marine interests, is broadcast each day at 10.30 a.m. from Arlington, containing reports of 8 a.m. weather conditions at about 50 land stations, weather forecasts for marine and aviation zones, storms, and hurricane warnings, etc.

In connection with the radio service a "Vessel Weather Service" is in operation on about seventy-five vessels sailing between New York and New Orleans and ports in the West Indies and South America.

A similar service is in operation on the Pacific coast on vessels plying between San Francisco or Seattle and the Hawaiian Islands or the Orient. Reports from these vessels are forwarded to the offices of the Weather Bureau at San Francisco and Honolulu.

SMALL CRAFT, STORM, AND HURRICANE WARNINGS

Small craft warning. A red pennant indicates moderately strong winds.

Northeast storm warning. A red pennant above a square red flag with black center displayed by day, or two red lanterns, one above the other, displayed by night.

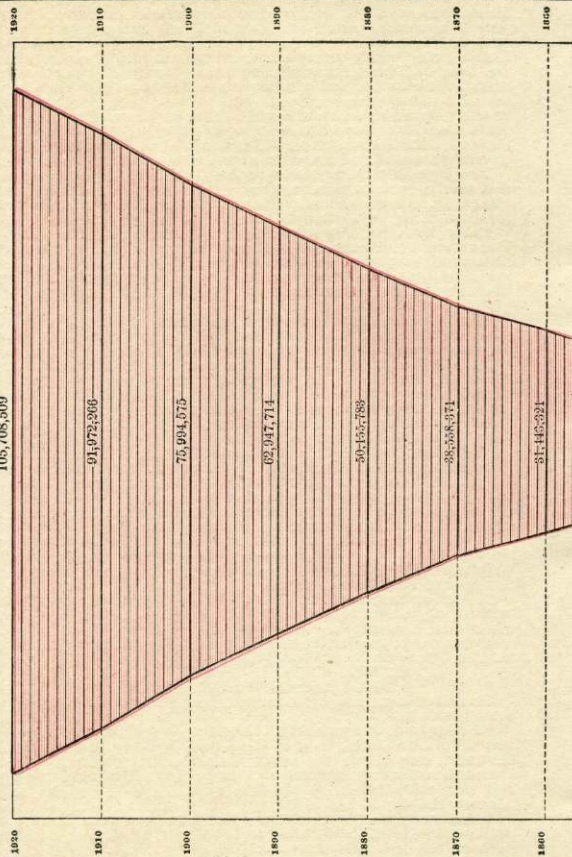
Southeast storm warning. A red pennant below a square red flag with black center displayed by day, or one red lantern displayed by night.

Southwest storm warning. A white pennant below a square red flag with black center displayed by day, or a white lantern below a red lantern displayed by night.

Northwest storm warning. A white pennant above a square red flag with black center displayed by day, or a white lantern above a red lantern displayed by night.

Hurricane, or whole gale warning. Two square flags, red with black centers, one above the other, displayed by day, or two red lanterns, with a white lantern between, by night.

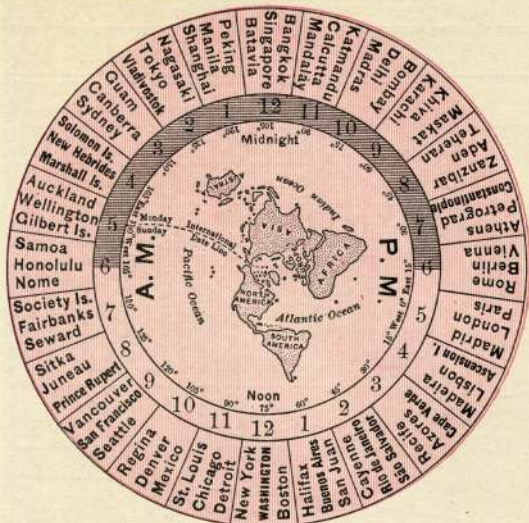

**THE INTERNATIONAL DATE LINE AND
CONVERSION OF TIME**

The meridian 180° east and west from Greenwich, which crosses the Pacific Ocean from the Aleutian to the Fiji Islands, is called the International Date Line. Here each new day has its birth at the instant when it is exactly noon of THE PRECEDING DATE at Greenwich; 7 a. m. at Washington, 4 a. m. at San Francisco, and 1:30 a. m. at Honolulu. It is thus evident that if a vessel west bound across the Pacific, were to continue her old calendar, without change, she would find upon her arrival in Japan, Australia, or New Zealand that she was one day behind in the day of the week and month. To avoid this it is customary, upon crossing the 180th meridian, to drop a day when bound west; to repeat a day when bound east. For instance, in the first case, Monday, October 24, would be followed in the log book by Wednesday, October 26, and in the second case, Monday, October 24, would be followed by another Monday, October 24.

STANDARD TIME

Almost all countries throughout the world use standard time based on the meridians 15 degrees apart from Greenwich, although some use standard time based on the longitude of their national observatories.

United States standard Eastern time is the time of the meridian 75° west from Greenwich. Daylight Saving Time is one hour earlier, and is in use throughout Europe as well as in some American cities and states.

In this State, the legal rate of interest is 6 per cent. Higher rates allowed only to corporations by contract. Under the statute of limitations, unexecuted judgment liens on real estate expire in 10 years unless recorded with county clerk. Mortgage or conveyance liens on real estate expire in 20 years. Notes expire in 10 years; open accounts are uncollectible after 5 years. Written promise to pay claim removes limitation.

POSTAL INFORMATION

First-class matter. Letters, postal cards, post card (private mailing cards) and all matter wholly or partly in writing, sealed or unsealed. Rates of postage—Letters, 2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof. Post cards and postal cards, 1 cent each. "Drop Letters," 2 cents an ounce or fraction thereof.

Second-class matter. Newspapers and periodicals bearing notice of entry as second-class matter. No limit of weight. Rate of postage—1 cent for each 4 ounces or fraction thereof.

Third-class matter. Circulars, newspapers, and periodicals not admitted to the second class, nor embraced in the term "book," miscellaneous printed matter, proof sheets, corrected proof sheets, copy accompanying same, and matter in point print or raised characters used by the blind. Rate of postage—1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Fourth-class matter (Domestic Parcel Post). Merchandise, farm and factory products, seeds, and plants, books, miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than 4 pounds, and all other mailable matter not in the first, second, and third classes. Rates of postage (prepaid unsealed)—are as follows: Parcels 4 ounces or less, except books, seeds, plants, etc., 1 cent for each ounce or fraction thereof, any distance. Parcels 8 ounces or less, containing books, seeds, plants, etc., 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, regardless of distance. Parcels more than 8 ounces, parcels or miscellaneous printed matter weighing more than 4 pounds are chargeable, according to distance or zone, at the pound rates.

Zones. For parcel post purposes the United States is divided into units of area 30 minutes square, which form the basis of eight postal zones.

The Registry System provides for careful transmission to any post office in the world of money and other valuable mail, furnishes receipts to the mailer, and provides for indemnity in case of loss. Fee for each separate article, foreign or domestic, 10 cents in addition to the postage.

The postal money order system offers a safe, cheap, and convenient method of making remittances by mail to all parts of the United States and its possessions, as well as foreign countries. Fees for Domestic Money Orders, payable in the U. S., including its possessions.
